Congressman McCandless:

In re: Opposition to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Superfund involvement in BLM Clear Creek Management Area (CCMA) recreation area.

The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) is seeking public comment on its proposed cleanup plan for the Atlas Asbestos Mine Superfund Site located in the BLM's Clear Creek Management Area (CCMA) in Fresno County northwest of the City of Coalinga. I support the parts of the plan that stabilize and prevent asbestos from migrating downstream to Coalinga and the San Joaquin Valley and that stabilize the site to erosion.

However, the EPA is now trying to expand its control power to the majority of the CCMA due to the presence of naturally occurring asbestos in this area. Natural occurrences are outside EPA jurisdiction. This area has been used for many years by 1,000s of OHV enthusiasts, rock and mineral collectors, hunters and sightseers. EPA is demanding that the BLM revise its carefully considered management plan of the area and close the CCMA to virtually all recreational activity. EPA Project Manager Dan Meer has overestimated the health risk from the type of asbestos found in the area.

EPA's hazard assessment is seriously flawed because it fails to take into account the wide range of risk from the different mineral species that are grouped under the term "asbestos." EPA admits that it currently has a group studying the problem: "There is a group in EPA that is currently investigating the possibility of assigning different potency factors in some fashion to the different types of asbestos minerals. Their work is not finished. It's...the study's in progress right now. And if and when they do conclude that we can assign different cancer potency factors to the different types of asbestos, then we'll incorporate that into the risk assessment as much as possible" (Mr. Greg Baker, Sunnyvale Public Input Meeting, May 30, 1990). EPA should refrain from demanding that BLM use EPA's current flawed risk assessment until this matter is resolved.

I request that you officially look into this groundless invasion by EPA into our BLM's Clear Creek Management Area. Please contact Manager Dan Meer in his San Francisco office at 800-231-3075, FAX 415-744-1070 to help rectify this intolerable situation. Please keep me abreast as to the progress of the resolution of this matter.
